



ASSIGNMENT OF PAST COPYRIGHT: BACKGROUND INFORMATION

DISCLAIMER: This document is not intended to be a substitute for specialist advice, which should always be sought when entering into any legal commitment. It is supplied for your own personal use subject to Inngot Limited's terms and conditions, which you have accepted prior to receipt, and which are repeated below for reference.

When to use this document

It is always advisable to resolve any issues around copyright ownership in writing *prior* to the commencement of any outsourced work. However, in practice, there are many occasions when collaborations are initiated in the ordinary course of business without a clear view as to whether any outputs will result.

If such collaborations result in a third party contributing to the development of intellectual property (IP) that you intend to use, you need to ensure that your commercial rights will not be affected by any subsequent claim or dispute. This assignment form has been drafted to document a transfer of copyright between two willing parties for this purpose.

The third party might be an individual who is not an employee of your company, or another company. The contribution may have been made in one or more ways, through involvement in designs, marketing materials, software development or photography. In fact any form of consultancy where copyright material has been produced should be covered by an assignment if you intend to use or incorporate this material within your own products and services.

Note that the assignment wording includes a warranty from the third party that they have the rights to pass copyright in the materials described in the Schedule.

How to use this document

The assignment form needs to be completed with relevant information prior to use and is provided as a standard word processor file (.doc format). The parts most likely to require modification are highlighted using **red type** or **[red type and square brackets]** on the file. When editing the document please ensure you tailor all these sections to suit the circumstances, without deleting any sections in ordinary round brackets (as shown here).

- a) The date at the top should show the date on which the agreement is intended to come into effect. This does not have to pre-date the creation of the copyright material – it should reflect the dates of signature.
- b) The information at i) relating to the Author should provide sufficient detail to identify them clearly and unequivocally. In the case of a limited company the address used could be their trading address or their registered office if this is different. It is also helpful to insert the registered company number where applicable.
- c) The information at ii) should be completed on the same basis.
- d) The amount inserted at 1. will usually be a nominal sum (such as £1), on the basis that separate arrangements have already been made with the third party to remunerate them for their services. Sometimes it is appropriate to agree a higher amount depending on the nature of the contribution that has been made.
- e) As with point b) above, the Schedule should contain sufficient information to identify the copyright material clearly and unequivocally. It is advisable not only to describe the material, but also to indicate the dates between which it was produced.

Licence conditions for Inngot file templates

In this Licence:

“Inngot” means Inngot Limited, registered in England and Wales no 6426697, whose registered office is at Technium Digital, Singleton Park, Swansea SA2 8PP;

“Documents” means the file templates provided by Inngot for the use of licensees;

“Licensee” means the person wishing obtain documents for their own use via the Inngot website;

Inngot grants the Licensee a non-exclusive worldwide licence to use the Documents, subject to the Licensee’s acceptance of the following licence terms:

1. This licence is personal to the Licensee and cannot be assigned, transferred, sold or otherwise disposed of to any other party.

3. “Inngot” is a registered trade mark. This licence confers no rights of usage over the mark, other than permission to include an attribution to Inngot as the source of the Documents, at the Licensee’s option.
